His name, often linked with that of the flautist Joseph Tacet, was used as a trademark by the flute makers Thomas Collier and John Hale (*c*1770–85). Florio's role in the development of the flute with multiple keys has now been discredited, so it is noteworthy that his 1778 policy describes him as a musical instrument maker. Florio's association with Caleb Gedney, who made the earliest extant *Florio* flute (1769), is underlined by his marriage to Gedney's daughter Catherine in 1766.
